#### SCRATCHBUILDING A FREIGHT PLATFORM

ny modeled era from 1850 to the present can benefit I from having one or more simple freight loading platforms beside sidings. This platform not only fits in any American railroad scene, but the project can help many modelers to overcome their reluctance to scratchbuild using wood. Of importance, this platform provides a new location for spotting freight cars without hogging a lot of space on your layout. Rich will present some general wood scratchbuilding techniques and then the group will embark on a fun-filled session of cutting, gluing, painting, and custom detailing their custom freight platforms. Platform placement alongside the track will also be discussed.

Those who wish to build a freight platform might bring basic tools (hobby saw, knife, cutting surface, straightedge, sand paper, and paint brushes). Some water-based paint will be provided but if you know what color you want your platform to be, bring that paint.


This is not a kit. Rich will provide ideas, plans, and materials, but each person will decide on how to build their own platform.

#### DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF PROTOTYPE BUILDINGS FOR MODEL RAILROADERS

ave you ever asked: Why does that Railroad Station have a pitched roof and long overhangs? What are those raised brick areas for on that warehouse? Why are the tops of the windows arched on some masonry buildings and not others? What is the purpose of the bracing below the roof of a roundhouse? How are glass curtain walls held up on modern buildings?

These and other questions will be answered in this clinic, providing insight into how and why prototype buildings are built the way they are. Bill draws on his experience designing new buildings and retrofitting existing buildings. This clinic briefly introduces the general engineering concepts used in the design of buildings, but don't worry there won't be a test. Bill surveys the various materials common in building construction, including how their use has changed over time and is influenced by geography. The basic parts that make up buildings from roofs to columns will be Finally, prototype discussed. examples will be presented to explore how the buildings are built and how their structure influences their outward appearance.


And of course **Jim Harter** and our module group contributed to the success of the show by giving the public the hands-on thrill of operating multiple trains on the track with digital command control. Job well done!

The first was at the Middlesex Canal Museum, where a small linear display of standard modules, another display in HO by Art Ellis, and G-scale layouts were displayed for the public. The third event was the National Heritage Museum in Lexington MA. This year we exhibited a rectangular display with 25 modules. Friday's snow may have cut into the attendance this year because Sunday's attendance was larger than Saturday's. The majority

of our visitors were children. I would like to extend a special thanks to everyone who helped at these three events, especially to the newer members who were helping out for the first time. These events are only successful through your help.

Now we are faced with our largest show of the year, the Amherst Railway Society show, which will be held at the Eastern States Exposition in West Springfield, MA at the end of January. We will be exhibiting the largest number of modules our group has ever assembled at one time. Currently we have a few slots open, but not many. ## EXCHANGE TRACK MODEL RR HOBBY SHOW

he Wrenham Museum is holding its annual Model Railroad Hobby Show on January 7, 2006, from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. There will be 100 dealer tables with everything for the model railroad enthusiast, plus a snack bar. Wrenham Museum will offer half-price admission to all Hobby Show ticket holders on the day of the show (offer only good that day). The Museum has a room dedicated to seven different model railroad layouts, as well as a special exhibit, *Snow Train to Bakersville*, a winter village G scale model display, and the new *Beavers: Creatures of Industry* exhibit.

The Model Railroad Hobby Show will be held at the Baker School on School Street in Wrenham, MA. The school is handicapped accessible. The show fee is \$5 for adults, \$1 for children 6-14, and \$10 for a family (under 6 free). The snow date for this event is set for January 8.

## EXCHANGE TRACK PETITION TO CHANGE NMRA CONTEST SCORING

In 1995, the scoring system for NMRA contests was changed. The new system reduced the maximum for Detail from 25 to 20 points and reduced the maximum for Scratchbuilding from 25 to 15 points. The maximum for Conformity was increased from 10 to 25 points. Members of the Lone Star Region believe that the new system greatly reduces the opportunity to compete with a freelance entry, no matter how well the entry may have been built. The term "conformity" remains mysterious, with few people able to define to what standard a model must conform in order to be considered well done.

We also believe that the reduction in points for Scratchbuilding reflects a lack of respect for the modeler who does the research and uses ingenuity to build without the benefits of a kit. A modeler who can build a kit, using precut parts and explicit plans, then scratch build two or three small additions, can earn nearly as many points in that category as the modeler who puts in hundreds of hours determining how to cut and assemble an original model.

Following Jim Packer's article in *Scale Rails* (page 18, Sept. 2005), he received considerable encouragement from NMRA members supporting a petition to revert to the old scoring system. The proposed scoring for NMRA-sponsored contests and the Achievement Program are: Construction: 40 points; Detail: 25 points; Conformity: 10 points; Finish & Lettering: 25 points; and Scratchbuilding: 25 points.

## The Assabet River Rail Trail (ARRT)

n September 24, 2005, the Assabet River Rail Trail in Marlborough and Hudson was officially dedicated. The bike trail follows the former Marlborough branch of the B&M Railroad from downtown Marlborough through the town of Hudson to the town line with Stow. Although the railroad stopped operating many years ago, vestiges of it can still be seen. Starting at the end of the trail in Marlborough, you can see old trackside mill buildings. Further along the trail, you can find an old brick warehouse that had its own spur. After looping around the new Boston Scientific corporate campus, the trail slopes downhill and passes under the connector highway between I-290 and Rt. 85. Soon you come upon an old telltale and some interesting stone abutments of a now-demolished farmer's wooden bridge. After this, the trail crosses Rt. 85 and descends to the bridge over the Assabet River, a high steel trestle that was dismantled, repainted and reinstalled. A new timber deck for the bike path now rests on top of the girders where the bridge ties used to be. Adjacent to this bridge you can see an old mill that was served by the railroad. The mill site includes an old coal trestle spur. Further along the bike trail, you can see other areas of warehouses and industries that were served by the railroad. A new addition in this part of town is the B&M caboose, donated by the Edaville Railroad. This caboose is now a symbol used to identify the bike path. If you have some time and want to get some exercise while studying our railroading past, come visit the ARRT bike path in Marlborough and Hudson.

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




