
Presentation: NMRA's Achievement Program By Don Howd, MMR



Empire Junction NER Convention

The NER had another annual convention. This one hosted by the Central New York Division in Syracuse, NY, on September 6 to 9.

The convention was somewhat a repeat of the excellent convention this same division hosted in 2008. They offered so much last time that I never made it to a single clinic. This time I made it to some clinics and did a full slate of three excellent operating sessions. Sadly, the host of one of those operating sessions, Dick Martini, passed away on the Wednesday after the convention due to complications following surgery. On Saturday afternoon, Dan Fretz, John Lutz and I went train spotting at the DeWitt yard. This is a major yard on the East-West main line of the former New York Central through New York, now part of CSX. We found the pedestrian overpass at the east end of the yard and caught a series of trains heading in each direction in rapid succession. We saw two stack trains, a unit tank train, a maintenance-of-way train and an Amtrak train, all within the span of about 20 minutes. The experience of a freight going by only inches below your feet resting on an open grating is quite exhilarating.

n my last column I covered our lazy summer pastimes and railroading Lbut now it's time we turn to fall. New England is about a change of seasons and I don't know about you but for me Fall is absolutely the busiest time of year. The grass seems to grow faster with a little moisture, cool nights and warm days and mowing and leaf removal are ongoing tasks. Fortunately I was able to attend to this just before I left for Syracuse and the NER convention.

But I am neither rich nor famous, so instead, with family I reminisced and laughed around a fire pit on a cool Friday evening with the smell of wood smoke in the air. The rain held off on Saturday with bright sun for the entire wedding and the following day we stopped at that "Farm" my grandfather started when he came over from Czechoslovakia. The apple orchard is now run by his granddaughters (my cousins) and I must say the apples tasted just as delicious as I remembered them. You can still hear the train horn down in the valley when it blows for the crossing in Ballston Lake.

This past weekend it was off to Hopedale (on the Grafton and Upton) to set up our layout at a retirement home as part of the town's Oktoberfest. We had nearly 100 people through the door and we made a point to focus on steam power since that is what most of the residents recalled from their younger days.

September is already gone now and we'll be entertaining family for the Columbus Day weekend. In this case it will be the fall foliage that we will stop to enjoy during a walk through the local Audubon preserve. It is also a time when railfans and model railroaders alike can take to the woods by following some of those "Rails to Trail's pathways. As the leaves drop, our views expand to sometimes catch old buildings and or structures exposed along the right of way. As you close your eyes and smell the wood smoke, you can almost imagine some of those early wood-burning locomotives clattering along the rails through the woods.

A Train Elevator

Our former Editor updates us on the construction of his HO layout.

ne of the design elements that must be included in every multilevel layout is how trains will get from one level to another. In my design phase, I deftly tucked a helix into a corner. I was proud of that until I realized that it would not work. For awhile I was despondent. I had already built most of the benchwork and didn't want to tear things out, if possible. The track plan had lots of things I wanted. It looked like I'd have to bite the bullet and deal with two separate layouts.

I found several whole-train elevators online, which raised and lowered trains from six- to eight-feet long. I only needed an elevator that could handle three-foot long trains. I am modeling the 1875 western era, with silver mining, wood/lumber hauling, towns that require goods, and a few industries that have products to ship out. My 2-6-0's and 4-4-0's are short engines. The freight cars are 24- to 32-scale-feet long and passenger cars are 40 feet long. I designed the layout with 36-inch long passing sidings and eight-inch diameter turntables to get the most bang for my square foot of layout space. I will run

six- or seven-car trains, which is consistent with what those prototype locomotives could handle.

My layout levels are separated vertically by 21-inches. I wanted the elevator to rise almost 24-inches. I found a drawer glide that supports drawers of up to 100 pounds and can be extended 24-inches. I mounted the glides on a vertical 2x4-foot piece of ¾-inch plywood. I then mounted 1x2's on the glides and fastened a ½-inch plywood backplate to the 1x2's. The train ledge was made from 1x4 pine set into a routed groove in the backplate. The backplate and train ledge are both 40 inches long.

The elevator was attached to benchwork that I designed to accommodate it. Four 2x2 posts were framed in a rectangle with 5-inches of clearance between the posts on the short side, enough for train clearance into and out of the elevator track, and 48 inches between the outsides of the posts on the long side, for mounting the train elevator.

I have more work to do on the elevator. It will have counterweights and will be driven by a small motor. Conceptually, the train will go into a tunnel to get to the elevator. The train will stop on the elevator and the operator will raise or lower the elevator to the other level, then drive the train out of the tunnel to continue on its way.




